

Child Maltreatment Reporting

Parents, you play a key role in ensuring the health, safety, and well-being of children. Please know that all individuals working with children in a childcare program are mandated to report suspected child abuse or neglect. But, there may be a time as a parent, you might find yourself in the position of needing to make a report regarding the safety and well-being of a child in the care of the Child Development Center (CDC), School Age Care (SAC), Youth Center (YC) or other base programs or activities.

How to report child abuse

If you witness or suspect an incident of child maltreatment, please make a report to the **McConnell AFB Family Advocacy Program (FAP) at 795-5768**. Additionally, we request that you also make a report to the **Department of Children and Families** (Child Protective Services) at **1-800-922-5330**.

You will be asked for identifying information about the child, adults involved and the specific information about the nature of your concern. Your information as a reporting party is never disclosed. You may also file an anonymous report.

After the report

If the case is found to meet the criteria for child abuse or neglect, treatment to promote family functioning and prevent further abuse or neglect may be recommended.

If the case does not meet criteria but the family is under stress, services including parent education or counseling may be offered to support the family and reduce the risk of abuse and neglect.

To protect the privacy of all those involved, an individual making the report will NOT know the outcome of a referral but can have confidence that reporting is the right thing to do when the safety of a child is in question.



YOUTH SUPERVISION GUIDELINES FOR MCCONNELL AFB

Note: The ages specified are the maximum ages and are based on the child's development and level of functioning. Children who do not consistently demonstrate age-appropriate behavior or have a medical condition that affects capability or decision making should not be given the same degree of responsibilities. In all instances below where a "yes" is indicated, the parent is responsible for using reasonable judgment based on child development and for any incident or mishap (not considered preventable) which occurs.



Military Child Care In Your Neighborhood (MCCYN)

Serving Air Force and Space Force Families

How It Works

MCCYN is a fee assistance program that keeps affordable child care in reach for eligible families. It's intended for families who cannot access installation-based care due to distance or waitlists. With fee assistance, a portion of the child care is paid to reduce and offset the costs of what families would pay for on-installation child care and what they would pay for care in their communities. This makes it easier for families to afford quality care from local community providers.

Families access MCCYN through MilitaryChildCare.com, a secure DoD gateway to military-operated or military-sponsored child care options. It provides a single online location for families to determine their MCCYN eligibility, explore qualifying providers, and request assistance.

MCCYN is available to Active Duty members, Reservists on Active Duty, DAF Civilians and Gold Star spouses who:

- 1. Are stationed at an installation with an extensive waiting list
- 2. Do not live near a DoD installation with a Child and Youth program

If the sponsor is married, his or her spouse must be employed, actively seeking employment, or a full-time student.

How to Get Started? It's Easy!

Create an Account

If you don't already have an account, go to MilitaryChildCare.com to create one. Once you create an account, set up a Household Profile so you can conduct a search for care at any time from any location.

Search for and Request Care

MilitaryChildCare.com allows you to search the full range of military child care options. Search for care, and if available, submit a request for MCCYN for each of your children.

Wait for an Offer

MilitaryChildCare.com will send you an offer for care if space becomes available. Keep your email address up-to-date in your Household Profile so you do not miss these important messages.

Upload Required Documents

If you receive an offer for MCCYN, you will receive a notification from MilitaryChildCare.com with instructions on how to accept the offer and upload eligibility documents.

Ways the School Liaison can assist families

•Provide information for inbound families about local school districts

•Provide contact information for outbound families for the School Liaison at their next assignment.

•Ensure awareness of other educational options (e.g., home schooling, private schools, charter schools and cyber/virtual schools)

•Educate school staff about the unique issues impacting military children (e.g., deployments, frequent moves, BRAC, combat, etc.)

•Assist in rectifying problems that cannot be resolved using the school channels

•Provide information on graduation requirements and post-secondary preparation

•Can assist you in locating a preschool for you child, although preschool is not free or required in Kansas.

•Can assist with transfer of credits, academic issues and extra-curricular issues due to changing schools

•Provide support for deployed families including materials for families, referrals and communication with the school. •Monitor any significant changes in school demographics that may affect federal funding formulas to local education agencies

•Monitor federal and state legislation that might affect the educational opportunities of military children

Frequently Asked Questions

Where will our children go to school if we live on base?

If you have children and live in base housing, they will attend the Derby Public Schools (USD 260). Grades K-5 attend Wineteer Elementary, which is within walking distance. Students in Grade 6-8 will enroll at the Derby North Middle School. Derby High School enrolls grades 9-12.

What is the best school district in the local area?

If you are interested in school district "ratings," the best place to find information is the website of the Kansas Department of Education (KSDE). School and district report cards are available online at http://ksreportcard.ksde.org. You can also look at sites such as Niche or Great Schools The SLO can also help you gather more information about schools that would be a great fit for your child.

At what age can my child start school in Kansas?

Your child must be 5 on or before August 31 to enter kindergarten. Children must be 6 on or before August 31 to enter first grade. Children who attended kindergarten in another state may complete kindergarten or enroll in first grade here regardless of their birth date. Kindergarten is not mandatory in the state of Kansas.

What are the state procedures for homeschooling?

All homeschools are considered Non-Accredited Private Schools in Kansas. Kansas does not specifically authorize "home instruction" or "homeschooling." Therefore, you are required by law to register the name and address of the private school (homeschool) with the State Board of Education. The form is available online at www.ksde.org.

What about transportation? By Kansas law, if you live 2.5 miles or more from your assigned public school, your child will be able to ride a bus provided by your district. If you live closer, you must provide transportation. Also, if you transfer to a different district, you will be responsible for transportation

What about after school care? School Age Care on the base provides before and afterschool care and transportation to and from many Derby schools. Many schools also have latch key programs. Check with the School Liaison or your school for more information.
